Opportunities and Challenges in Branch Campus Evolution: A State and System Perspective



Dr. John (Jack) Keating began his new duties as chancellor of the University of Wisconsin, Parkside-Kenosha/Racine, on July 1, 1998. He is the fifth person to serve as chancellor since the university opened 30 years ago. Prior to accepting the leadership role at UW Parkside, Dr. Keating served as provost of the University of Alaska at Fairbanks (UAF). During his four years at UAF, Dr. Keating lead a revitalization of the university's research and teaching missions, forging a cooperative bond between the two potentially conflicting factions. Dr. Keating earlier served as the founding dean and vice provost at the University of Washington branch campuses

at Tacoma and Bothell. In this assignment, Dr. Keating helped lay the foundation for reaching the schools' enrollment goal. He also served as a professor at the University of Washington. Dr. Keating received his Ph.D. in social psychology in 1972 at The Ohio State University. He also holds an M.S. degree in theology from the University of Santa Clara (Calif.), along with a B.A. in classics/philosophy and an M.A. in philosophy from Gonzaga University in Spokane, Wash.

The Future of Higher Education: A 2020 Vision and Its 1999 Implementation



Wallace Loh was selected by Governor Locke to head the Executive Policy Office in September 1997. A native of China who was raised in Peru, Dr. Loh also is a long-time resident of the U.S. He was dean (1990-95) and professor (1974-1995) of the University of Washington Law School and has published widely in the field of law and social science. While at the University of Washington, Dr. Loh was elected by students as the Outstanding Professor of the Year in 1990. He also served as a visiting professor at Cornell, Texas, Vanderbilt, Emory, Houston and Peking universities, and a research fellow at the University of Louvain (Belgium). Dr. Loh is a graduate

of Grinnell College (B.A.), Cornell University (M.A.), the University of Michigan (Ph.D.) and Yale University Law School (J.D.). He is author of the book *Social Research in the Judicial Process* and a former president (1996) of the Association of American Law Schools. Dr. Loh returns to Washington from Colorado, where he was vice chancellor for academic affairs and dean of faculties at the University of Colorado at Boulder (1995-97).

The Changing Nature of Our Higher Education Industry: New Challenges and New Opportunities



Marvin W. Peterson is a Phi Beta graduate of Trinity College (1960) with a B.S. in engineering. He holds an M.B.A. from Harvard University (1962) and a Ph.D. in higher education from the University of Michigan (1968). His professional career has included faculty, administrative and research positions at the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration and at the University of Michigan. At the U of M, he held appointments in the Center for the Study of Higher and Post-secondary Education, the Institute for Social Research, the National Center for Post-secondary Improvement, the National Center for Research to Improve Post-secondary Teaching

and Learning, and the Program in Higher and Continuing Education. Dr. Peterson is professor of higher education and former director of the Center for the Study of Higher and Post-secondary Education. His extensive research activity has included projects funded by the United States Department of Education, United States Department of Labor, National Science Foundation, National Institute of Education, W.K. Kellogg Foundation, Ford Foundation, Exxon Foundation, Mellon Foundation and the Spencer Foundation. Dr. Peterson's numerous articles, chapters and research reports relate to his primary research interests in organizational and administrative behavior and institutional research and planning in higher education. In 1978, he was selected as one of *Change* magazine's "100 Young Leaders of the Academy."
